<u>Travel Trailers</u> are a non-motorized RV designed to be towed but a pickup truck, SUV, or (size dependent) care. These unites offer all of the amenities of home. Depending on the model and floorplan, some units can sleep up to 10 people, which makes them ideal for larger families.
